This is only the second year that Mr. Joes has been together.

Mosshart, originally from Cleveland, moved to Southfield three years ago and started playing baskettall in the men's league. It was there he met a few athletes and discussed forming a softball team.

"We're basically a young team . . . all of us are athletes and all of us have played various other sports," he said. "We felt if we could get some good athletes we could adjust to any position on the field."

Mr. Joes won the City of Southfield Parks and Recreation Men's Class A slow-pitch softball title last season. This summer Mosshart's team played

in the Novi Open League where it finished with a 13-2 record (the two losses were by forfeit).

Mr. Joes has compiled a 28-6 overall record this season, including the five tournament games over the weekend. Assuming they get the financial backing, Mr. Joes is now looking forward to improving that record over the Labor Day weekend.

"We want to represent Southfield and the state of Michigan in the best possi-ble light," said Mosshart. "We're not sure of our financial situation. If we can put together the funds required for a trip of this magnitude then we'll go."

Just for the record, Mr. Joes participated in last year's ASA men's state softball tournament as a class B team. And, do you know where Mosshart's team finished? That's right: third.




