"It should expedite much of the paperwork," said District Judge Mar-garet Schaeffer. "And things are less likely to get lost between the cracks."

likely to get lost between the cracks." WITH THE computer, Schaeffer sold, processing overdue traffic tickes will be simplified. The system will give an automatic printout of drivers having overdue tickets. Court employees now go through a lengthy process of con-tacting the secretary of state's office and then typing out overdue notices. "It will also type out docket sheets (court case schedules)," whe said, add-ing it will be easier for attorneys and judges to rearrange court schedules with the computer.

While the computer should stream-line the court's paperwork, Schaeffer said it will not force any employen layoffs. But the computer, she added, will help avoid the need to hire addi-tional employees in the future as the court's caseload grows.
