<u>Grounded</u> Rocks stop run, Raiders fall 12-7

One man's ceiling is another man's floor.

The adage applies to Plymouth Salem's somewhat surprising 12-7 victory over North Farmington Saturday.

One man's ceiling: Salem's defense held North's normally potent running game to a mere 64 yards.

Another man's floor: North tailback Ken Goss, who, with 4.5 speed in the Voyard dash, ran for more than 600 yards last year, rolled his ankle the night before the game and couldn't play.

SALEM TOOK AN early 6-0 lead in the first quarter when Ken Harmon picked off an errant pass from North's Secto Brapero an attempted halfback option and ran it in from 22 yards out. The extra point was missed.

The passing game failed North also, Quarterback Eric Engel completed just eight of 30 passes and had two intercepted.


