given readings from coast to coast. From 1978-69, Forche worked as a journalist and human rights investiga-tor in EI Salvador, and has galbed na-tional recognition for her writings. Her book, "The Country between Us," was named the Lamont Selection of the Academy of American Poets. Forche has previously been awarded the Yale Series of Younger Poet Award (1976) for "Gathering the Tribes," along with a Chicago Review Prize, the Penerge Williams Fellowship in Po-etry, the di Castagnola Award of the Poetry Society of America, and others. Forche's lecture is presented as part of the International Week's focus on Central America. Her topic is "The Poet's Voice."
