Area spot provides job training program

Southfield Community Placement Division will be the local agent for delivery and administration of funds under the new Job Training Partnership Act.

The division of the Southfield Department of Human Resources has been established as agent for the Oakland County Job Training Partnership Act Program in an area which includes Southfield, Southfield Public Schools, Lathrup Village, Farmington, Farmington Hills, Bloomfield, Bloomfield Hills, Beverly Hills, Franklin, Southfield Township and Birmingham.

The projected budget for the program from Oct. 1 to June 30 is \$328,087. More than \$3.8 million in federal funds is being channeled through the state to Oakland County for job training programs for youths, unskilled adults and economically disadvantaged residents.

The job training act goes into effect Oct. 1 and replaces the Comprehensive

Employment and Training Act (CETA). The new act is primarily designed to provide training to eligible people in occupations identified by the private sector.

"While training of individual residents is the special emphasis of the new program, there will be many direct advantages to Southfield from being a local delivery agent," said Southfield City Administrator Del Borgsford.

"WE WILL GET many employees for Southfield from the various youth programs funded through the job training act. In fact there is a strong possibility that these numbers will increase. Also, our business community will get funding for many employees placed in on-the-job training positions in Southfield."

The program focuses on classroom and on-the-job training and limited work experience in such areas as computer programming, medical assistance, bookkeeping, secretarial, word processing and dental technology.
