Activist shares 'Trip for Peace' experience

Marian McCracken, retired Farmington elementary teacher, will show her slides and share experiences of her recent "Trip for Peace" at 7:30 p.m. Sunday in First Presbyterian Church of Farmington.

Under the guidance of the Women's League for Peace and Freedom, with

about 10,000 international marchers, she protested for peace at NATO headquarters in Brussels. They presented petitions from all over the world, protesting nuclear arms and war.

McCracken's presentation includes an in-depth conversation with another teacher in East Berlin about various

values and approaches in education in our differing societies.

Another view of Western European responses to the United States proposed need for Pershing II and cruise missiles will be presented by Michigan Nuclear Weapons Freeze. The program

includes a new slide show "On the

Brink," showing what the missiles look like, first strike capabilities, and Western Europeans' responses to missile placement in their countries.

Numerous published authors and literary agents Stephen Axelrod and John K. Payne will be on hand as well.

Judith Guest will speak following luncheon at noon, Saturday. Poetry will also be well-represented.

Sharing their expertise will be poets John Disky, Linda Nemec Foster, Judith Goren and Edward Hirsch.

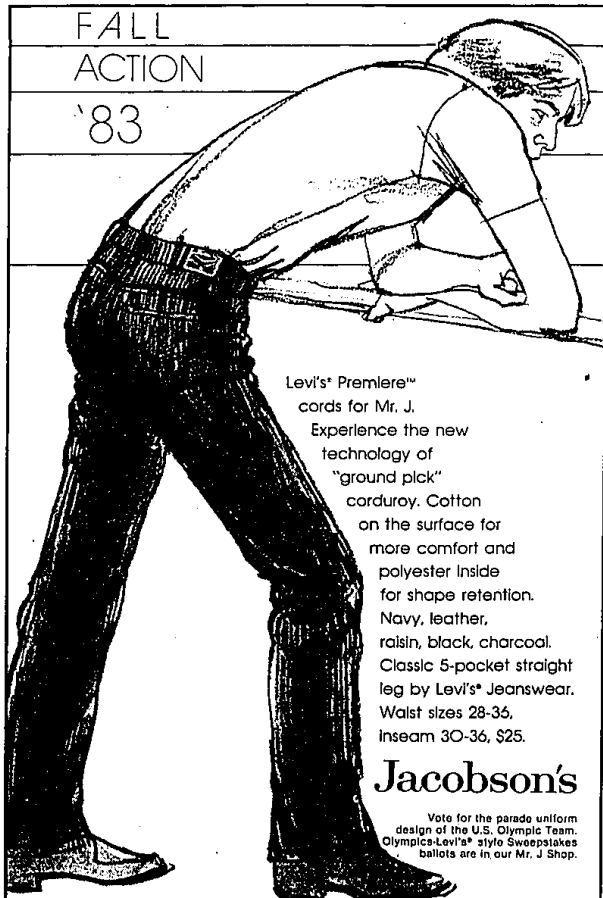
