## **Walled Lake District** looks at budget cuts

Walled Lake's Board of Education last week publicly uncovered details of the district's financial position. It attempted to show that anything less than 12.1 percent reduction in teacher salaries this year will devastate the district.

The financial data was presented at the first fact-finding hearing on Sept. 13, under the direction (Barry Brown of the Michigan Employment Relations Commission (MERC).

tions Commission (MERC).

The teachers union, represented by Karen Filar and Gerald Haymond of the Michigan Education Association (MEA), has proposed a salary freeze in 1883-84, but wants a 7 percent isslary increase in 1884-85 and a 9 percent increase in 1985-86. Throughout her presentation, board negotiator Rita Thomas maintained that Wailed Lake students already have been affected by program and staff reductions and further reductions will gut the district's academic enrichment programs, including sports, music and all extracurriculars.

"THIS YEAR, labor peace will only be gained if the teachers Join in the board goal to maintain educational integrity in programs provided Walled Lake school children, "Thomas said.

Walled Lake taxpayers, with low per capita income and high unemployment, are taxed at a higher rate than surrounding districts, Thomas said. Because the district lakes tax income from industry or highly valued property, local taxpayers bear the burden of school funding, she said.

"The average salary for a Wallad Lake teacher is rhore than \$30,000 annually. The average salary for teachers in Michigan is about \$23,900, and Michigan teachers are the sixth highest paid in the nation, according to 1982-83 National Education Association statistics.

The district has no teachers on the starting sal-ary schedule and only 15 of 474 teachers have less than five years' experience. Thomas said. The dis-rict has 269 teachers with master's degrees and six with doctorates. More than half of the district teachers are on the top of the salary schedule, which explains why the average salary in the dis-trict is high, she said.

Without the board's proposed 12.1 percent wage ut, Superintendent Don Sheldon has suggested pos-ble reductions in the following programs, services

and personnel:

Elimination of elementary reading support

program.

Elimination of elementary guidance.

Complete shut down of Outdoor Education

Complete Snut upon to Conter.

Fifty percent reduction of winter and spring extracurricular and athlete activities.

Eliminate audio/visual program.

Cut one senior high counselor from each high

THE TOTAL savings from these cuts, after accounted for unemployment for laid off employees, is about \$805,000.

Other suggested cuts include reducing elementary teaching staff by 15 positions, which would increase class size to an average 27th students. The elimination of elemetary instrumental music, general music, art and physical education programs also has been suggested.

What the board is saying is that these cuts are not acceptable, said the assistant superintendent for business, Russell Wright, in the explanation of the cuts at the Sept. 13 hearing. 'According to the board), any further reductions will be detrimental to our students."

Other alternatives to reductions include increasing the elementary class size average from 25 students to 30 or 35. Staffing could be reduced by 30 to 50 positions, with an estimated cost savings of up to \$1.2 million.

The union has not addressed the impact of such cuts on the district, although spokespersons have said the union would prefer layoff so tealary cuts.

"We maintain (the request for a 12.1 percent salary reduction) is unreasonable and borders on the ludicruous. More realistic budgeting with a milliage to method of curing the fills the board foresees," Haymond said at the fact-finding hearing.
