## OCC enrollment rising

Led by a pair of computer courses, Oakland Community College's enrollment has risen another 5 percent this semester, according to President Robert F. Roelofs.

"Most other schools I've heard from are flate except Schoolcraft, where they've had a 3 percent increase," Roelofs told the board of trustees last week.

"It's less than the 7.5 to 8 percent increases
we've had. But, remember, we're at a higher base
(number of students) now."

Community colleges tend to be counter-cyclical to the economy — their enrollments rising in bad times and declining when jobs are plentiful.

OCC's four campuses enrolled 28,000 individuals and about 15,000 full-time-equated students, the president said.

SOME 400 students signed up for the new Computer Aided Design — CAD, in high-tech jargon.

"We're off and running with a big bang," said Roe-

lofs,

Established in 1988, Focus:HOPE is a civil and tuman rights organization of 22,000 people.




