Clarenceville seeks new school chief

The Clarenceville School District's The Clarenceville School District's search for a new superintendent got underway last Thursday with the signing of a contract with the Michigan Association of School Boards for assistance in the selection process.

The contract, signed by the Clarence-ville Board of Education at its meeting, pays the MASSI a maximum of \$2,500 in exchange for training, publicity and clerical services.

The district's tentative schedule calls for a new superintendent to be hired by May 15, 1984, about six weeks before

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


