Check insulation. If the ceiling or attic has less than three inches, more is needed. A minimum of six inches is recommended. The number one cost-effective step to save energy is to in-stall insulation in the attic.

 Use storm windows or plastic coverings to provide a second layer of protection. Repair broken windows.
