Maturity was the key. We have two sophomores and three juniors. We are a young team. But these kids are exceeding way beyond our expectations,"

It was that maturity that kept Kavanaugh's young learn from crumbling under Mercy's furious fourth-quarter rally.

With four minutes left in the game, Baker called timeout. His team, trailing still by seven, seemed void of polse. The timeout triggered Mercy's last gasp effort.
