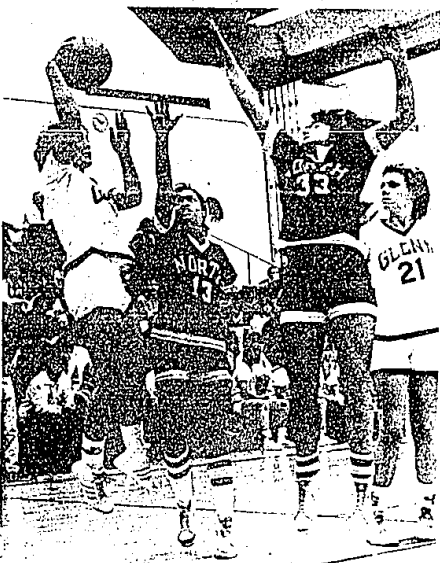


Austin and Shaw ignite Raiders

North plays tall, tops Glenn in showdown

All odds, it seemed, were against the visitors from North Farmington. But in the end, the Raiders prevailed.

First of all, John Glenn was playing before a loud and large home crowd. Secondly, its starting lineup consisted of four players taller than 5-foot-10 — North had one player of that size.

But, the team that makes its shots wins and that team was North Farmington, 47-39.

The win keeps North atop the Northwest Suburban League with a perfect 4-0 record. Glenn's loss is its second in league play.

GLENN COACH George Sommerman was not pleased with the outcome, but the game itself, he said, was not too bad.

"Hey, this was a lot of fun. There was a big crowd and they were really into it. It's just too bad we shot so poorly," he said.

Their poor shooting prevented the Rockets from making use of their size advantage.

"If you miss those little ones inside, you can't exploit the situation. It's a painful thing. It's heartbreaking, really," Sommerman said.

The Raider defense had a lot to do with the Rockets' poor shooting. The Raiders played a cleverly disguised 3-2 zone defense in the first half and modified it significantly in the third quarter. The modification was the brainchild of North's junior varsity coach Greg Capling.

"GREG SAW something in the first half and we changed our defense. We kept our big people down in the wings instead of having them come up," said Raider coach Greg Grodzicki.

What the change did was close up the

middle, and forced Glenn to bomb away from the outside. North had excellent rebounding position as a result, also.

"We have some very smart people," Grodzicki said. "They block out really well underneath. That was the key, because they were a lot bigger than us."

Amy Austin and Laina Shaw led the attack for North, while Suzanne Howley and Mary Koszicki did yeomen's work on the glass. Austin also was a force on the boards, and on defense.

"She is such a complete player," Grodzicki said of Austin. "As a coach, you just got to let her go do her thing. Nine out of 10 times, she makes the right plays."

AUSTIN DID her thing to the tune of 18 points. Shaw hit for 15 points, most on long-range jumpers.

Austin got North off to a flying 16-11 start, scoring eight first-quarter points. The last six of the quarter all on free throws. Austin also made two sparkling assists on baskets by Koszicki.

The second quarter was played a little on the sloppy side, with both teams committing turnovers and unnecessary fouls. North ended the half ahead 26-20. The unnecessary fouls would come back to haunt both teams, especially Glenn.

The third quarter was all Shaw. She forced Glenn out of their press by sinking six long jumpers from the corner. Her layup at the buzzer put North up 37-30.

FOUR GLENN PLAYERS were in foul trouble. Diana Sommerman and Michele McCullen eventually fouled

She completed the three-point play and North was back up by six.

"Was that a turning point in the game, or what," Grodzicki said, knowingly.

Shaw, however, fouled out with 5:45 left and North went more than three minutes without scoring another point.

THE Rockets could score just twice during the Raiders' drought.

With the score 40-37, Koszicki calmly sank three out of four free throws, and later, Austin did the same to ice the win for North.

Bergman led Glenn's scorers with nine points. Pucci added eight and Castonguay had seven. Koszicki chipped in eight for the Raiders.

North is now 9-1 overall, and Glenn is 8-3.

Mercy tops Regina

North Farmington won every event in capturing its first Northwest Suburban League swim meet of the year, dunking Redford Union, 128-42.

Double winners Colleen Carey and Jill Menclley led the attack as the Raiders improved their overall record Thursday night to 5-2-1.

Carey grabbed a first in the 200-yard individual medley (2:30.3) and then came back to win the 100 breaststroke in 1:12.0. She also was a member of a winning relay team, combining with Kathy Pierog, Kate Harnden and Jody Gerst to win the 200-medley relay in 2:04.6.

Menclley, meanwhile, took firsts in the 200 freestyle (2:15.7) and 500 freestyle (6:10.11). Pierog was also a member of the winning 400-freestyle relay team (4:18.0), teaming with Diane

McSweeney, Holly Epstein and Jennifer Rowe.

Other winners for the Raiders were Helen Sue Howard in the 50 freestyle (7:22), Amy Monette in the 100 butterfly (1:19.9), Gerst in the 100 free style (1:03.7) and Laura Detzel in the 100 backstroke (1:19.8). Marcy Hawk won the diving competition.

LIVONIA STEVENSON, behind record-setting performances by Mary Schoelke and Sheila Toornima, swam past Farmington Harrison Thursday night, 104-64.

Schoelke set a pool record in the 100 butterfly, winning in 1:02.6. She also teamed with Chrissie Schweidt, Kathy Sullivan and Toornima to set a pool record in the 400 freestyle relay team (4:52.4).

October 11, 1983

Mayor Pro Tem Williams opened the regular meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council at 7:45 P.M. on October 11, 1983. Members present: Burwell, Dolan, Williams and Wolf. Absent: Hughes, Lange and Scornen. Others present: City Clerk Cairns and City Attorney Poehlman.

James Ellis of Rotary Club announced that this year's Vocational Service Award will be presented to Jan Dolan for her development of the Senior Citizen Day Center at a luncheon on October 25, 1983.

Minutes of September 26, 1983 were approved as amended.

Council adopted Resolution establishing a payback agreement for water main and paving on Cora Street.

Council approved Resolution No. 3 for EDC setting Public Hearing on October 24, 1983 for North Valley Associates Project located at Northwestern and Valley Road.

Resolution No. 1 approving project area and project district area for Kinder-Care Learning Center, Inc. was adopted and Resolution No. 2 designating Harlem Morris and Donald Meade as additional EDC members for Kinder-Care Learning Center, Inc. located at Farmington and Tulipwood Road.

Resolution No. 1 approving project area and project district area for Northwestern Enterprises Limited Partnership was adopted and Resolution No. 2 approving the Limited Partnership located at Northwestern and Wellington.

Reappointment of James D. Donlon III to the Pension Committee was confirmed.

Council approved amending SADC C-178 paving assessment for Richland Gardens, Section 38.

Council approved an agreement for paving and a marginal access drive at Twelve Mile and Drake Roads with Sloan and Slavick, Builders, as outlined in the City Attorney's report.

Council adopted Resolution empowering the City Treasurer to invest surplus funds in "Short Term Investment Fund for Governmental Surplus Funds" with National Bank of Detroit.

Contract is approved with Plants and Moran, CPA, to perform Managerial Audit and Electronic Data Processing Study.

Council declined proposal of Oakland County Road Commission for local participation in resurfacing Farmington Road from 1-886 to 13 Mile Road and Intersection County to honor its original plan commitment.

Council approved the reimbursement to John Umis for the difference in cost between a 10" and 12" water main which will become part of the integrated water supply system "A."

Council approved agreement with Village of Franklin to provide police dispatch and law enforcement services as outlined in City Manager's Report of October 11, 1983, subject to City Manager and Chief of Police approval.

Council authorized City Attorney to take proper legal action to force compliance of Meeting requirements with Grand Haggerty Auto, located on Haggerty Road.
