Obeldi herself is included, of course.
Born in the southern part of Turksy, in a town called lakendaru, a hog grew up in Adena. At age 18, with her parties, she came to Michigan.

'I had already graduated from high shool in Turksy, but I did college work here at Eastern Michigan University,' he said.

"BUT THE dark-haired boulique owner tried other careers. Once abe rignaged a law firm very competently. "Her husband Michael, also born in Three, has close family there in the civiling business. Both her relatives in Turkey and in America encouraged her to sell the fashion indigenous to her native land.

The Turks export a lot to Europe, but hardly anything here, "she explains. In addition to clothing, Obeld has displayed around her annall Southfield Road bouldue, hand-crafted copper and silver plates of various sizes. Each is decerated with an intricate design which might be floral, or depict nature, birds or other motifs.

"The plates are hand-done in a trade

handed down from one generation to another," she said. "Now, the young people are getting caught up into high tech trades and the plates are not being made for the first time." Obeldi says she has been collecting them for a long time. "They can only be found in Turkey, and when I go there, which is often, I try to find more."

"EVERYTHING in my shop is made in Turkey. Both the designs and the ma-terials are Turkish."

Obeldi, who says she has always been determined to be a career woman, is also adept at the homemaking arts. She cares for her daughter, Georgette Tanya, 2, cooks and keeps house happly.

In the shop she is all busineswoman, explaining that she has exclusive access to several Turkish designers' clothing.

We carry designs by Negir, Ahmed Orsan, Atalar, Damia and Idil, she says. "Atalar does suits, wools, and capes. Orsan does wonderful knits, and Negir-works in silks and woolens." Obeldl admits her own favorite in Negir.

"She's well known in London where she has a boutique."

High fashlon is a big industry in Tur-key, Obedi says the Turka follow Euro-pean trends sery closely.

To show the Turkish designs to ad-vantage, Obedi looked through books of high fashlon models' picture, finally choses Vida Grad, who just to be a former Miss Michigan World and Model of the Year ss well as a South-field resident.
