

Hawks short in bid for West Division crown

The Plymouth Canton swim team clinched at least a tie for the Western Lakes Athletic Conference Western Division swim title Thursday night by dunking Farmington Harrison 96-74.

Both (Harrison coach) Mark Holridge and myself had figured beforehand that it would be about a two-point head that it was," said Canton coach Hooker Wellman. "No way did I think we'd beat them by 23 points. Our depth made the difference."

The Chiefs won nine of 11 events and captured key points with second, third and fourth place finishes.

Riddits swimming a 4:03.76. Joy and Tucker swam one-two in the 200-free, Joy swam a 5:41.02 and Tucker a 5:42.28.

The big surprise for the Chiefs came in the diving competition. Without the services of their No. 1 diver Cindy Sherwood, who was ill, Sen. Neville won first with 170.03, and freshman Megan McGow came through with 162.83 to take second.

McGow's performance eclipsed a freshman diving record set by — of all people — Neville.

Other first-place winners for the Chiefs were: Margaret Gilligan in the 200-free (2:07.40), Kirk in the 100-backstroke (1:10.00), and Elliott in the 100-breaststroke (1:17.88).

The loss drops Harrison to 3-5 on the season. Canton is now 6-2, 4-1 in league play.

NORTH FARMINGTON surrendered first place to Glenn's Jay Hunt (16:31), but came on to take four of the next five spots to win the meet.

Hunt's time set a record at the 3,000-meter Oakland Community College course.

Kirk Armstrong (16:48) was second

for North. Eric Bennett (17:12) and Ken Welso (17:19) took third and fourth.

Glenn's Jim Kolodziej (17:21) was fifth, and North's Jeff McCormick (17:23) was right behind him.

"I told my boys that we had to have three people ahead of Kolodziej. That was the key for us. I told them to 'Get rid of him early or else he'll bring us down,'" said North coach Al Van Meter.

Van Meter also said he thinks his team is just now hitting its stride.

"My team has been a sleeping giant up until this time," he said. "I think we are going to surprise a lot of people in the league meet and at the regionals."
