7EST BLOOMFIELD has grown from a close-knit community to a sprawling suburb in their lifetime.

But two residents, who grew up in the township, wouldn't live anywhere else, Marilyn Smith moved to West Bloomfield

— she has lived here since.

Come November, West Bloomfield High School English toacher Sherry Fisher Abrams will move into a home in the West-wood Village subdivision where she grew

SMITH, who works in the township as-sessor's office, recalls "It was great grow-ing up" in Westacres subdivision in the township's northwest.

"There wasn't an awful lot in the township then, but we had tun growing up on Middle Straits Lake."

Moving to Doherty Estates, one of the few rural-style subdivisions in the township's southeast, gave the same feeling as Westacres — minus the lakes, she said.

There, she and her husband raised their Jim. now 23, married and living in Fenton, and Sue, 21, engaged and still at "It all seems like one big town to me," Smith said. She retains her Westacres con-nection, because her parents still live there. Her work at town hall keeps her in touch with other areas of the township.

"Everything is so familiar. We would do the same thing again," she said, of choos-ing West Bloomfield. "It's my home. I have no great desire to move anywhere etse. Maybe I don't know any better."

ABRAMS has fond memories of West-wood Village, off Maple botween Middlo-bett and Orchard Lake Road, and hor West Bloomfield childhood.

"In Westwood, it was kind of like college everyone running in and out of each other's houses like dorm rooms," she said. 'Things were much less formal.

'The school (Green Elementary) was generally the focus because the neighbor-hoods were so spread out," Abrams said.

"The community was very, very close. Clubs and organizations were strong." High school football games drew both students and parents, she recalled from her vantage point as a cheerloader. Abrams is happy her daughter, Alyssa, will now experience "my years of growing up in West Bloomfloid which were so warm and wonderful."

As a teacher at the high school she attended, she has similar hopes for her atu-dents. "I want them to feel it is a communi-ty where people care about one another.

"I'm real happy to be here.
