

# Hawks bounce back to win 4th straight title

The streak is over.

Farmington 'Harrison's one-game losing streak came to an abrupt end last Friday night as the Hawks, once again, pummeled Walled Lake Central, 30-0.

Another streak remains in tact.
Harrison's consecutive league championship streak is now at four. The Hawks won the last two Western Six League titles and now have taken the first two Western Lakes Athletic Association titles.

"WE WERE real fired up tonight," said Harrison coach John Herrington. "We had to prove we could come back." They certainly made believers out of the Vikings. In the two meetings between the teams, Harrison has outscored Central 61-0.

"We did pretty much the same things we did last time." Herrington said. "I told the team that there was no dis-grace in being beaten, But, If you stay beaten, then there is. This was the most intense I've seen this team play all sea-son."

John Miller, Harrison's All-State jun-ior back, typlified the Hawks' intensity. He carried the ball 24 times for 161 yards, scored three touchdowns and in-

"The whole team was really up," said Miller. "We had to prove we were still No.1, and that's exactly what we are."

ROB SMIGIELSKI got the Hawks off and running as he blocked a punt on Central's first series. Terry Grabinski scooped up the ball and ran it 17 yards to the Viking 6. Two plays later Miller scored from the 2.

On the point after try, Miller, who was holding for kicker Dave Quarles, took a high snap and rolled right took and the find a pass into the end zone that was tipped and wound up in the hands of Harrison's Sieve Orsini. Harrison led 8-

The Hawks stopped Central on its next possession and drove to the Viking 24. On fourth down, Quaries attempted a 40-yard field goal in the midst of swirling crosswinds. The kick hit the crossbar dead center and fell forward; no good.

Central then drove to midfield before Bob Wasczenski made a spectacular in-terception of a Tom Menard pass at the

Harrison 36. Six Miller carrier good for 61 yards and a key Vince Enright-to-Geof Blusell pars good for 14 yards, set up a 3-yard TD pars from Enright to Wasczenski. After Quaries' point after, Harrison led 15-0.

On the very next series, the Hawks blocked their second punt of the game. This time it was Wasczenski crashing through to block it and Pat Misterovich recovered at the Central 29.

MILLER TOOK it in from there on the Hawks' first play. After two off-sides penalties against Central on the extra point attempt, Miller ran it in for two points. Harrison led 23-0.

Menard, with his uncanny ability to scramble away from would-be tackiers and hit receivers downfield, began to march his team down the field. He got it all the way to the Hawk 8.

On a second-and-goal play, Menard rolled to his right and was hit hard by Orsini and fumbled. Jerry Eizen alertly recovered at the Harrison 18.

Eizen, along with Jeff Shottroff, Ken Hixon, Smiglelaki and Orsini, stymied Central's offense all night. Central could muster just 38 yards net rushing on the night. Menard completed six of 14 passes for 63 yards, but he was con-sistently rushed out of the pocket.



The Hawks iced the game early in the fourth quarter. After a six-yard Viking punt put the Hawks at the Central 39, Miller took itye handoffs, gained 30 yards and scored from the 4. Quartes, who is now 18 for 20 in extra points, made it 30-0.

Central made one last drive. They got to the Harrison 13 before a Smiglenski sack pushed it back to the 22. Then Miller made a leaping interception of reserve quarterback Dean Nessen's pass in the end zone.

When asked after the game about the Hawks domination over the Vikings Herington said, "It's nothing special, really. It's just in the big games we seem to play real good. This is a great team, they proved that tonight. This might be the best team I've ever had."

The Hawks finish the regular season next Saturday at home against Monroe.

It wasn't until the middle of the third quarter that the Chiefs finally got on the scoreboard on quarterback Tony Aiken's 1-yard sneak, Jim Kaske made the extra point, and Canton led 7-0.

Canton's final score was set up by a 25-yard fum-ble recovery by Dave Knapp, Knapp picked up the loose ball at the Falcon's 45 and raced to the Chiefs' 20-yard line. On the first play from scrimmage,

tailback Rod Williams dashed 20 yards to ice the victory.

"It's been a long time coming. We kept them off the


