## Haig criticizes policy confusion in Middle East

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HAIG CAUTIONED that the U.S. overment must learn when it disa-rees with a democracy such as Israel, grees with a democracy such as Israel, it must do so quietly, around a table, talking as friends. "When we criticize publicly, we take away the platform of the democratic opposition who can't ide with a foreign government." Progress in the middle cast has only
