OU study pegs 'master teacher'

a caring person — one who knows the material, is innovative and organized, and who feels that the major ingredient in the ideal school would be a dedicated, cohesive group of teachers. The ideal "muster teacher", would most like to work for a principal who exhibits strong leadership. That teacher would relieve work stress through talking the matters out with colleagues or family or through physical or emotional means rather than through specific relaxation tech-

THESE CHARACTERISTICS were cited frequently in a study of 34 master teachers' chosen by their colleagues in a survey of elementary ischools in two area school districts. The report is entitled "Perceptions of Outstanding Elementary Teachers About Themselves and Their Profession."

The study has just been completed by Jean L. Easterly, an associate professor in the Oakland University School of human and Educational Services.

sor in the Cakhana University School of buman and Educational Services. Easterly did not give the names of the school districts but said they have a combined total of 28 elementary schools. They have diverse populations which vary across the total socio-conomic scale and diverse ethnic back-grounds.

Associate Professor Easterly distrib-Associate Froncisor Essecty many uted a questionaire among the teacher asking them to identify one, two or posibly three teachers who best met it criteria for an outstanding teacher.

THOSE QUALIFICATIONS estab-lished by Easterly included an ability to convey enthusiasm to others, to or-ganize, to be a continual learner, to de-velop effective working relationships with others (adults, parents, teachers, administrators) and to treat each stu-dent as a unique personality. The teachers who were identified by thelp peers as outstanding were then in-terviewed by Easterly to offer some in-sights into the profile of a "master teacher."

Completed at a time when winds of educational change are stirring up the profession, Easterly said ber study prevides a vital building block in the knowledge base essential to understanding the lives of outstanding contemporary teachers.

She says replication of the study should take place in other geographic areas and that it should be expanded to include teachers in high schools, justor high schools and middle schools.

From this pooled knowledge, she says, oew ways of identifying outstanding teachers will be developed as well as new roles and reward systems.

THE EASTERLY study found that half of the "master teachers" were influenced to join the profession by other

In other responses, the teacher said they were able to balance a professional and personal life.

Some 11 of the 24 teachers said time management was the most stressful problem. Other areas cited by the group included interpersonal relationships with parents, lack of administrative support and expecting good behavior from students and not gotting it.

about them.

OF 24 "master teachers" queried, 15 said an ideal school would have a dedicated, cohesive group of teachers as its most important ingredient.

Second in importance, according to the teachers, were the necessity of school-wide goals (12 teachers said their ideal school should have a definite purpose or sease of mission).
