The state Board of Education will consider an appeal this week of a deci-sion from the 1982 Oakland Intermedi-ate School Board that denied the trans-fer of Walled 'Lake School District property to Farmington Hills Raymond Gedmer, state bearing of-fleer, recommends that Section 6 of Farmington Hills be transferred from Walled Lake to the Farmington School District.
