Farmington Hills Our Lady of Mercy will not repeat as Class A state champions. Film Northwestern defeated the Marina 44-41. Friday night in the semilinals of the state girls banketball tournament at WMU's Read Fieldhouse.

The game was a nall-bitter from the start, with the Wildcast taking an early lead and the Martlins furiously trying to come back. Several times, the Martlins surpassed the Wildcats, but they couldn't put them away—the reason; poor shooting.

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"I FELT the difference in the game tonight was our poor shooting," said Mercy
coach Larry Baker.
The numbers will bear him out. Mercy
made just 16 of 48 shots from the floor, a
palltry 33 percent.

"I'm not going to apologize for my team.
They played hard. This was a great game
between two great teams. They just shot
better tonight," Baker said.
Northwestern (26-1) jumped ahead of
Mercy 14-11 after a quarter.
In the second quarter, like in the second
quarter of the first game between these two
teams (which Mercy won in overtime).
Northwestern threatened to run away from
Mercy. At one point, Mercy went scoreless
in eight possessions, and the Wildeats lead
22-13.

Basford led Mercy with 14 points, 10 in the second half. DeMattia and Rowsowski each scored eight. Rossowski also had nine.

Tonya Edwards led the Wildcats with 12 points, Tipton and Taraisa Wills each had 10.
