Botsford chef shares recipe

In the spirit of holiday giving, chef Mattie Miller shares a recipe that is served only during the holiday season in Botsford Inn.

Branded Apple Torte begins with a flaky pastry that is rich with butter and lightly dusted with brandy. Its topping is golden with delicious apple simmered in apricot syrup. The final touch is a glistening apricot glaze with just a bit more brandy.

PASTRY TORTE

1 cup sifted flour
2 Tbsp. sugar
1/4 tsp. salt
1/2 cup butter
2 Tbsp. shortening
1 tsp. grated lemon peel
1 egg lightly beaten
1 tsp. cold water

Combine flour, sugar and salt. Cut in butter and shortening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add lemon peel, egg and water and mix to form a stiff dough. Roll out on a lightly floured board. Fit into a 10-inch quiche pan or pie plate. Chill thoroughly. Prick pastry. Bake in a preheated 400 degree oven 15 to 20 minutes, until lightly browned. Cool.

BRANDIED CREME

3 oz. package vanilla pudding mix (we make our own)
1/4 cup milk

2 Tbsp. brandy (or 2 1/2 brandy flavoring)
1/4 whipping cream, whipped

BRANDIED APPLES

4 golden delicious apples
1/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup Smuckers' apricot jam
1 cup water
2 Tbsp. lemon juice
2 Tbsp. brandy (or 2 1/2 brandy flavoring)

Pare, core and cut apples into eights. Combine sugar, jam, water and lemon juice and heat to boiling. Strain pressing through a sieve. Pour prepared syrup into large skillet. Add apples and cook, covered, five to ten minutes longer until apples are cooked through but not broken and soft. Turn carefully to glaze evenly. Remove apples from pan and cool. Stir brandy into apricot syrup and save syrup to glaze torte.

TO ASSEMBLE TORTE: Spoon pudding mixture into cooled, baked pastry shell. Arrange coated apples over the pudding. Carefully spoon apricot brandy syrup over apples. Chill thoroughly before cutting. Makes one 10-inch torte.
