Holiday plants have ugly side

with the traditional boliday plants hobily, misticleo, poinactia, Jerusulem cherry, also known as Christmas cherry. Many of these plants have portions that are poisonous if they are eaten. Holly is an evergreen with shipy, dark green leaves and bright red berries. It is these berries that are the most toxic portion of the plant. Typical symptoms resulting from ingestion of the berries are nausa, vomiting, abdominal pain and diarrhea. It is believed that between 20 and 30 berries can be faital to children.

The leaves of the holly plant affect the central nervous system. Treatment depends on the quantity of the plant or berries ingested. Generally, vomiting should be induced unless the patient is comatose or has lost the gag reflex. Prompt treatment in a hospital emergency room is essential.

All parts of the mistietoe could be diangerous, but the small white berries are highly poisonous. Acute stomach and bowel tritation associated with vormiting and diarrhea are some symptoms of mistietoe poisoning. As small an amount as one or two berries could prove toxic to a child. Respiratory and cardiac difficulties resulting from eating the berries have led to death, especially in young children, ingestion of any part of the mistietoe requires immediate treatment at the nearest emergency room.

THE MOST common Christmas plant is the poinsettla, which has an unjustified reputation as being very toxic. While the poinsettla has not been associated with any reports of death, it can produce abdominal pain, diarrhea and intense vomiting. Chewing the plant causes irritation of the mucous membranes which can lead to swelling of

the mouth and throat.

The milky sap of the poinsettia can produce temporary blindness if rubbed into the eyes or dermatitis if it comes into contact with skin. Treatment consists of flushing the eyes with cool water for five to 10 initutes and the patient should be seen by an ophthalmologist or other physician for further treatment. The sap should be washed from the skin with soap and water.

The Jerusalem cherry plants feature bright scarlet or yellow truit. All parts of the plant are toxic. The leaves and & &.

berries contain solanocapsine and sola-rine, respectively. Both are cardiac depressants which exhibit symptoms similar to digitalis toxicity — nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, headenb, blurred vision, mental dullness and peripheral paralysis. Dermatitis can occur from direct contact with the fruit of the plant, Treatment is basically the same as for ingestion of the holly plant. Skin

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irritations can be handled by thoroughly washing with soap and water.
