

# Botsford expansion expected to begin this week

build new fourth and fifth floors on the south tower. That addition would provide the hospital with approximately 30 percent more room than the original north tower.

Although some beds in the north tower would be closed, the additional floors would offer about 35 new beds.

**THE PROJECT** also calls for moving the lobby south of the existing entrance and adding three elevators, nurses locker rooms, expanded surgical and cafeteria areas. New visitors areas, patient solariums and examining rooms also will be added.

Although council members voted 3-2 in mid-November to introduce the zoning amendment in Botsford's favor, ap-

prehension loomed before the final vote was taken a week later because a full four-vote majority was required to amend the ordinance.

of the managers of Taggs clothing store on Grand River, qualified her rejection with "No. I'm sorry. I cannot help you. This is our busy season."

**AND ALTHOUGH** Crowley's officials refused to specify the fashion stores' sales increase this Christmas, spokesman Bob Carlson said "we were very pleased with sales at our Farm-

ington (Hills store on 12 Mile)." Both Crowleys and K mart officials report increased sales in cold weather apparel such as men's overcoats and boots.

But not all merchants in the Farmington area reaped the benefits of a healing economy. Dave Reed, manager of the Farmington Bike and Repair Shop on Orchard Lake Road, says last year's Christmas sales were much better than this year.

"Boy, it was really a mall Christmas and it did not trickle down to the specialty shops," Reed said. But he added that the cold weather tends to mix ideas of bicycle buying.

Just as the weeks before Christmas turn into a shopping spree, the days following the holiday spell return and ex-

change — generally. But most merchants are reporting that exchanges and refunds, in particular, are down from previous Christmases.

Right on," he said. "The others will say, 'I live in Midland or Miami. Can you recommend a shrink within a two-mile radius?'"

But the real cure, Kiley stressed, is for a Peter Pan to take control of his own life. Victims shouldn't wait for or rely on institutions such as churches, psychology clinics or special courses to change their lives.

**"WE HAVE** to take the reins in our lives," Kiley said.

The first step toward doing this, he said, is admitting the problem exists.

Kiley estimated that a majority of the adult population today suffers from either Peter Pan Syndrome or the Cin-

derella Complex.

"We have an awful lot of adults living unfulfilled, painful, lonely lives," he said.

The Cinderella Complex, a term coined by author Colette Dowling two years ago, describes a woman's hidden fear of independence and the common misconception women have that their independence leads to loss of femininity.

Although Kiley said he foresaw a continuation of the social and economic conditions that produce Peter Pans and Cinderellas, he said all is not lost.

Little boys trapped behind ties and desks need only face up to their fears, take bold of their own lives and admit, as Peter Pan did, that "to live would be an awfully big adventure."


