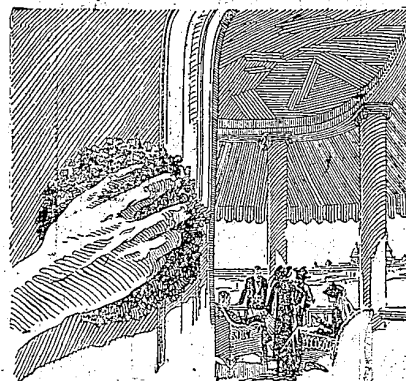
TRAIN DISPATCHING BY  
TELEPHONE IS URGED

Called First Important Move  
Needed on Many American  
Railway Lines

In a recent editorial under the  
heading "Extend Telephone Train  
Dispatching," the Railway Age de-  
clares that the provision of facilities  
for the transmission of train orders  
by telephone "can be considered  
legitimately one of the first improve-  
ments needed on many lines."

The editorial quotes with approval  
a recent statement by a railroad  
operating officer that "the installa-  
tion of a telephone train dispatching  
circuit is one of the quickest means  
of increasing the capacity of any  
line so equipped." The reason for  
this, the Railway Age explains, is  
that the telephone reduces materially  
the time required by the dispatcher  
to secure information. As a rule,  
the greater part of a train dispatch-  
er's working time is spent in getting  
information about the location of  
trains, and his conversations with  
points along the line can be handled  
rapidly by telephone.

In conclusion, the Railway Age  
urges that railroad executives should  
give consideration at this time to  
the investigation of improvements on  
divisions where delays have been  
serious because of slow train dis-  
patching, and points out that "a  
telephone train dispatching circuit  
can be installed in a very short time."
