STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

White Pigeon—A scratch on his hand suffered while he was closing the postoffice door two weeks ago, has proved fatal to Daniel Grosse, of White Pigeon mail carrier.

Pontiac—The First Church of Christ, Scientist, of Boston, will be beneficiary of the entire estate of \$41,000 left by Peter Hanes, Farmington township resident, whose will has been filed in probate.

Pontiac—The Oakland County Pioneer and Historical Society celebrated its 50th anniversary. Residents of Farmington township had charge of the program in commemoration of the settling of that township 100 years ago this year.

Detroit—Robert W. Warren, Mr. and Mrs. Harry L. Warren, has received an appointment to West Point military academy, and has been ordered to report to Columbia barracks March 4 for examination. He has been a Boy Scout for many years.

Battle Creek—Transfer to the city of Battle Creek, of two unsurveyed islands in the Kalamazoo river, has been asked of the government by Representative Arthur Williams. The two islands are within the city limits of the city, and all rights and ownership were requested for public use.

Grand Rapids—The new automobile rates which became effective recently, show a decrease of 20 per cent in cost of liability insurance in Grand Rapids, according to safety director James Sinks, who says he has been informed that reduction of deaths and injuries during 1933 was held a contributing factor in the change.

Lansing—The State Highway Department will make strenuous efforts this summer, to control the dust clouds that follow traffic along the gravelled country roads, and will for that purpose, receive bids on 7,500 tons of calcium chloride, 150,000 gallons of light oil and 250,000 gallons of various surfacing materials.

Kalamazoo—Two of the oldest residents of Kalamazoo County died recently. Edward P. Titus, 95 years old, one of the best known builders of Kalamazoo in pioneer and later days, and Mrs. William H. Morgan, 55 years old, who last December celebrated with her husband the thirty-eighth anniversary of their wedding.

Ann Arbor—The University of Michigan ranks second in the list of leading universities of the United States in enrollment in the liberal arts department, according to statistics just compiled. The University of California, with the southern branch included, leads the list with 6,913. Michigan's total is given as 4,805.

Alpena—Owing to the great depth of snow in woods and swamps, wild deer have lost their footing places. Various hunting clubs of this section are strewing tons of hay in the accustomed feeding places. At this time of the year, the deer are so tame they come to lumber camps, and are fed on the ground around the camps.

Ann Arbor—June 13 has been set by the alumni association, of the University of Michigan, as reunion day for this year. Sixteen classes will return for reasons under the Displan, which brings each class back at three or four-year intervals. Included in the classes expected this year are: '03, '04, '05, '06, '07, '08, '09, '10, '11, '12, '13, '14, '15, '16, '17, '18, '19, '20, '21, '22 and '23.

Lansing—Professor W. M. McCool, head of the soils department at M. A. C., was granted a four months' leave of absence from April 1 to August 1, by the state board of agriculture, in session here. McCool will go to Europe to study agricultural conditions. He also will represent Michigan at an agricultural conference to be held in Rome during May.

Lansing—Two new courses will be established at Michigan Agricultural College as a result of action taken by the state board of agriculture. One of the new courses offered, and the most important from the standpoint of the college, is the liberal arts course. This will place M. A. C. in direct competition with the University of Michigan and other colleges of the state offering literary courses leading to a degree of bachelor of arts.

Flint—The Democratic State Central Committee met in Lansing and designated May 15 the time and Flint as the place for the state convention that will elect delegates at large and alternates to the National Convention in New York, June 17, and to nominate candidates for Presidential electors. Michigan is entitled to four delegates-at-large, but eight will be elected, four men and four women, and each will have half a vote in the convention.

East Lansing—That sugar beets paid the largest gross return to Michigan farmers of any field crop grown in the state last year, and that the United States continues to import about one-fourth of the sugar consumed from foreign nations, are reasons advanced for an increase in the Michigan acreage by Prof. J. P. Cox, head of the farm crops department at Michigan Agricultural College. From the standpoint of soil and climate, Michigan is particularly adapted to the growing of this crop over an extensive area.

SEASONABLE DISHES

This is the season of the year when we are beginning to have the fresh green vegetables—spinach, turnips, cucumbers and other greens.

Spinach—Wash spinach until perfectly clean and put to cook with only the water which clings to the leaves. When tender, season well with butter, pepper and salt and serve garnished with eggshells of hard-cooked eggs.

Scalloped Chicken and Corn—Use the remnants of cold fowl free from bones and gristle. For each cupful of meat take one cupful of corn and one cupful of cream sauce, then arrange in layers in a buttered baking dish. Cover with buttered crumbs and bake until the crumbs are brown.

Sweetbreads a la Newburg—Parboil a pair of sweetbreads half an hour in water with a bay leaf. Drain, remove the membranes and cut into small dice. Chop fine one-half cupful of mushrooms. Beat three egg yolks, add salt and paprika and two tablespoonfuls of cream. Beat three egg whites, add salt and one-half teaspoonful of sugar and add two well-beaten eggs. Put into heated ranchkins and serve very hot.

Mocha Cakes—Cream one-third of a cupful of butter with one cupful of sugar and add two well-beaten eggs. Add one cupful of strong coffee infusion and one-half teaspoonful of vanilla; then stir in two cupfuls of flour stiffened with two teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Fold in the stiffly beaten whites of the eggs and bake in sheets. When cold cut into desired shapes, cover with frosting and roll the sides in coconut.

Apples With Pork Roast—Core, peel and wash apples, remove seeds and rubs finely chopped eggplant apples to serve each one. Add butter to the bread crumbs and a little salt if desired. Place around the roast and baste while the meat is roasting with the fat from the pan.

Mocha Frosting—Stir two tablespoonfuls of hot coffee into a mass of powdered sugar as will make it of a consistency to spread. Strong cocoa may be used instead of coffee if desired.

TASTY DISHES

A nice dish for dessert that is a little different is prepared with cream, puff shells. Chop a few dates and nuts and mix with whipped cream, roll in sugar and serve. If the puffs are made very small they are especially satisfactory and are especially satisfactory and are especially satisfactory.

Apple Charlotte—Peel and core ten apples and mince them fine. Melt two tablespoonfuls of butter in a saucepan, add one cupful of sugar, the grated rind of half a lemon and half a teaspoonful of cinnamon. Stir in this syrup until they are soft. Mash fine, add two tablespoonfuls of apricot marmalade and let it cool. Butter a large mold, then stir in the mixture, dip the mold, letting them lap a little. For the bottom lay the strips of bread in the form of a star. Fill the mold with prepared apple, cover with a large slice of buttered bread and bake in a moderate oven forty minutes. Turn out on a plate and dust with powdered sugar.

Spanish Hash—Chop three or four cold potatoes, a slice of onion and a pepper and a dash of salt. Bind together with beaten egg and bake in a buttered pan until brown. Serve with macaroni.

Apricot and Banana Cream—Wash and soak one-quarter of a pound of dried apricots. While still hot sweeten to taste; there should be plenty of the syrup. Mash and rub through a sieve and when cold add three firm ripe bananas sliced thin. Stir together lightly and serve ice cold with thick cream or whipped cream.

Sweet Potatoes, Southern Style—Cook the potatoes in their skins until tender. Peel and cut them in thick slices and lay them in a greased baking dish, sprinkle with sugar, adding bits of butter to each layer. Bake thirty minutes in a slow oven; baste them occasionally. Serve from the dish in which they are baked.

Stuffed Onions—Choose the large mild softening onions. Parboil until partly done, remove the centers and stuff with bread crumbs, sausage, chopped hard cooked eggs and seasoning. Top with buttered crumbs, surround with thin cream and bake until tender.
