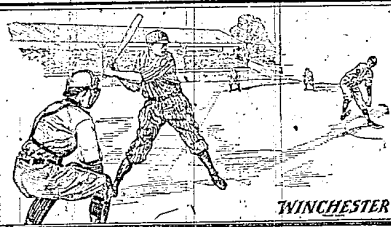

ANNUAL TOWNSHIP ELECTION

To the qualified electors of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland and State of Michigan, NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the next ensuing Annual Township Election will be held at The Farmington Town Hall (Precinct No. 1) Clareneville (Precinct No. 2).

within said township on MONDAY, APRIL 7, A. D. 1924. For the purpose of voting for the election of the following officers, viz: TOWNSHIP—One supervisor, one township clerk, one township treasurer, one highway commissioner, one justice of the peace, one member board of review, four constables.

PROPOSITIONS Also for the purpose of voting upon, the following propositions, viz: That of authorizing the Board of Supervisors to levy a one (1) mill tax on the valuation of Oakland county in the year 1924 for the purpose of constructing and equipping a county infirmary, detention home, contagious hospital, tuberculosis hospital and such other buildings as are necessary to carry out the purpose for which these buildings are constructed.

Relative to Opening and Closing of the Polls Act No. 20, Public Acts of 1919, Special Session.

Section 1. On the day of any election the polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be and shall be continued open until five o'clock in the afternoon and no longer; PROVIDED, That in townships the board of inspectors of election may, in its discretion, adjourn the polls at twelve o'clock noon, for one hour, and that the township board in townships and the legislative body in cities and villages may, by resolution adopted fifteen days prior to the election, published with the notice of election, provide that the polls shall be opened at six o'clock in the forenoon, and may also provide that the polls shall be kept open not later than eight o'clock in the evening of the same day. THE POLLS of said election will be opened at 7 o'clock a. m. and will remain open until 5 o'clock p. m. of said day of election, unless the Board of Election inspectors shall, in their discretion, adjourn the polls at 12 o'clock noon, for one hour, eastern standard time.
