WILDFLOWER TRIUMPHS IN DETROIT

Arthur Hammerstein's latest
musical comedy success, "Wild-
flower," familiarly termed (The
"Bambalina" show) has brought
Miss Edith Day and the entire or-
iginal cast and chorus to the
Shubert Detroit Opera House
where the piece will enter into its
second and last week on Sunday
April 13th.

The piece scored a tremendous
vogue last winter at the Casino
theatre and has come to Detroit
directly from a run of 50 weeks.

One notable feature of the en-
gagement is an augmented or-
chestra of thirty pieces conducted
by Herbert Stothart who collabor-
ated with Vincent Youmans on the
tuneful score. The book and
lyrics are by Otto Harbach, Oscar
Hammerstein, 2nd, and the story,
in brief, tells of Nina, a warm-
hearted, temperamental maid in
Northern Italy, caught in the
throes of an amusing love plot.

Miss Day, Arthur Ham-
merstein's radiant young star, por-
trays Nina with all the warmth of
her winning magnetism, her rich
modulated voice, and her gift of
spontaneous dancing. She it was
who created "Irene" in New York
and who first won fame dancing
"Tickle Toe" in "Going Up." Bern-
ard Gorcey, veteran fun-maker of
many of Arthur Hammerstein's
successes, appears as Gaston La-
Roche, about whose diminutive
but imposing personality much of
the fun revolves, and Esther
Howard, the gifted comedienne
appears as his valet which wife in
several hits including "The
World's Worst Women." Guy
Robertson, endowed both a singer
and actor, will be the lover. Other
notable members of the cast are
Bobby Higgins, Marjorie Bonner,
Tyler Brooks, Marion Randall,
Maryinez Randall, Jerome Daley.

The music of the play is re-
ported to be the best of many
seasons. At all events there are
ten notable pieces including "Bam-
balina," Miss Day's dance hit,
"Wildflower" sung by Guy Robert-
son, and "Apple Blossom," their
love duet, which wins many an
encore.
