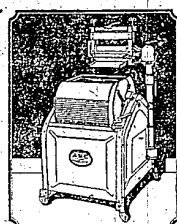

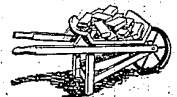
The Ladies Aid society of the M. E. church will hold an all day meeting in the church Thursday April 24th. A pot-luck dinner will be served at noon.

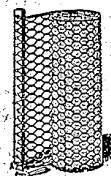
