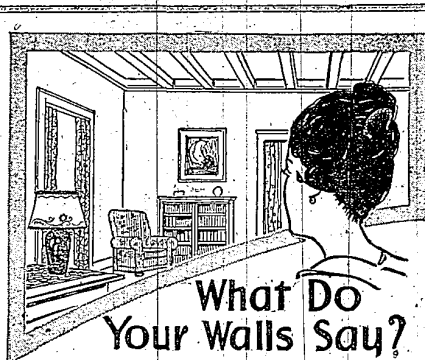

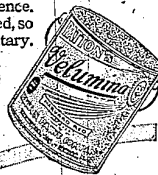

First American Shoemaker

The first recorded American shoemaker was Thomas Reint, who arrived on the second voyage of the Mayflower in 1623. He was under contract with the Plymouth company to make shoes for the colonists.
