SMALL POX

SITUATION SERIOUS
The smallpox situation at the present time is grave. An epidemic of hemorrhagic (black) smallpox has been raging in Detroit. Since January, approximately 1,500 cases have been reported to the department of health up to date. Up to May 31 there have been twenty-one (21) deaths but during May the fatality has greatly increased, about one hundred thirty (130) deaths having been reported to this date. Within the last week the same type of smallpox has been reported at Haslett, a small village about fifteen miles from Lansing and there have been four deaths within the last five days, with probably more to follow.

The four townships involved in this epidemic have been practically quarantined. All public meetings have been suspended, resorts closed and a complete vaccination of the rural population has been undertaken.

In the city of Lansing, the Manufacturers' association and the Merchants' association have agreed to vaccination of all their employees. Any person refusing vaccination are required to remain away from their business until all danger from an epidemic has passed.

It is hoped that these strenuous measures and the prompt and energetic action will prevent the further spread of the epidemic in the vicinity of Lansing. The only safeguard for any community is the general vaccination of all of the population and it is urged that every community take action to enforce vaccination and thereby prevent an epidemic which may start at any moment.
