Tradition states that it was found by the Empress Helena while on a visit to the Holy Land in the Fourth century and was deposited by her father for safe keeping in the cathedral at Treves. In the Ninth century the coat was concelled from invaders in the crypt of the church-but was brought to light and solemnly exhibited in 1104. It was not shown signil until 1512, when, owing to the vast crowds that flocked to see it. Pope Leo X decreed that it should be exhibited only once every seven years thereafter. 



The dam on the Tirs river in Sardinia, officially opened April 28, creates an artificial lake with a capacity of 460,000,000 cubic meters of water, which will give an estimated annual output of 50,000,000 kilowath hours of electric power and irrigate 15,00 acres of inst. The cheap power created by this dam will permit local electrolytic treatment of the core, which have been declopment of other industries in the region. This is the first of several similar projects in Sardinia to increase the agricultural developments of the Island.
