Maintaining Bell System Motor
Fleet of 8,000 Cars and
Trucks is Big Item

At the present time the motor
vehicle fleet of the Bell System con-
sists of more than 8,000 units. Of
every 1,400 cars in use in the United
States, one is in the exclusive service
of the Bell System. All but a very
small percentage of the cars carry
telephone tools and materials in
specialty adapted bodies, and to an
increasing extent the units are sup-
plied with various types of labor
saving equipment.

A majority of the cars have load-
carrying capacities of less than 1,000
pounds each, but there are several
thousand trucks capable of carrying
net loads of from 2,000 to 10,000
pounds and a few tractor-trailers
with load-carrying capacities as great
as 20,000 pounds each.

To operate this large group of
motor vehicles requires enormous
quantities of supplies. To transport
the gasoline used annually would re-
quire about twelve train-loads of 100
tank cars each and a 50-tank car
train of lubricating oil.

If the tire purchases were evenly
distributed throughout the year, a
new tire costing anywhere from \$10
to \$160 would be purchased every
three minutes. Fortunately, the \$10
tires predominate. In order to re-
place worn-out equipment, it is neces-
sary to buy at the rate of eight new
trucks or passenger cars every work-
ing day, not to mention the extra
units which must be added to care
for the growth of the fleet.
