DE MILLE CONQUERS STUPENDOUS TASKS IN BIBLE FILMING

To put on the screen the grandiose early events of Bible history would seem beyond human power did not one have the record of what was done in California recently and which is being presented twice daily to capacity audiences at the New Detroit Opera House in "The Ten Commandments" which begins its second week next Sunday afternoon. Here is what Cecil De Mille essayed—

The Exodus of Israel from Egypt the land of bondage. The parting of the Red Sea. The destruction of Pharaoh's chariots when the waters closed. The giving of the Commandments from Mount Sinai. The bacchanalian worship of the Golden Calf by the erring people. Heaven's terrible vengeance on the three thousand idolaters.

First he built an Egyptian city in the deserts of central California then the East of Pharaoh where Moses announced the Ten Plagues and won his plea: "Let my people go." Twenty-five hundred actors took part in this scene, including two hundred and fifty Egyptian Jews from Palestine.

The passage of the Red Sea and the confounding of the Pharaoh were accomplished by a cunning mingling of nature and art, the scenes being taken at Balboa Beach. Nearer Hollywood the graving by Moses of the Twin Tablets from the Divine letters in the sky was superbly achieved. Finally in a great canyon the Golden Calf idolatry was staged, with Moses descending from the Mount and a cyclonic windstorm and lightning stroke destroying the worshippers.

The immense work was preliminary to the filming of the modern story which deals with the effect of the Ten Commandments in the life of today. Among the eminent players who worked in one or other of the sequences were Theodore Roberts, Charles De Roche, Leatrice Joy, Rod La Rocque, Richard Dix, Nita Naldi, Agnes Ayres, Robert Edson and Estelle Taylor.
