COUNTY NORMAL SCHOOL

"The County Normal School, re-
established this year, is located in
the Webster School," says Miss
Blanche Peppie. It aims to give
the girls, who are taking the
course, a sound practical training
in how to teach fundamentals.
The work is carried on under the
two teacher plan, consisting of a
principal who has charge of the
academic work and the training
teacher who has charge of the
demonstration room where the ob-
servation work is done. Both
teachers have had special training
and experience in rural schools
and are able to give the best in-
struction possible along this line.
The special supervisors in art,
music and physical training of
the city schools are assisting in
their lines of work. State super-
intendent T. E. Johnson, city
superintendent J. H. Harris and
county school commissioner E. J.
Lederle comprise the County Nor-
mal board and have supervision of
the entire work."

ROAD COMMISSION SUE
FOR \$10,000 DAMAGES

The Oakland County Board of
Road Commissioners has been sued
for \$10,000 damages in a civil
action commenced in circuit court
by Nelson A. Sampson. He al-
leges that on July 9 while driving

an automobile on the Elizabeth
Lake road between Crescent and
Pleasant lakes a truck owned by
the county and driven by A. Hul-
chinson collided with his auto-
mobile. Sampson charges he was
painfully injured and lost the use
of his left arm for four weeks and
that his car was badly damaged.
He alleges the road commission
was negligent in maintaining the
roadway and that the truck was
not equipped with proper brakes.

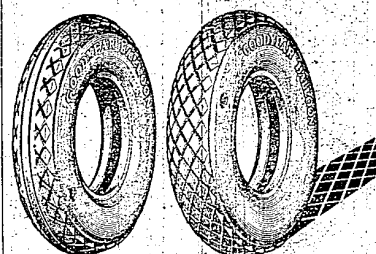
