BRIGHT FUTURE FOR TROOPERS IN ALL STATES

MICHIGAN COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC SAFETY SEES SPREAD OF SYSTEM FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT

Explains Troopers Duties

State Police Earn Their Way By Returns to State Treasury

"I see a great future for state police organizations in the states which now have them. Further than that I predict that a great many other states will sooner or later have such organizations."

Harry H. Jackson, commissioner of the Michigan Department of Public Safety, of which the State Police are the principal unit, was asked the question, "What future do you see for such organizations as the Michigan State Police after completing a full year in the work?" and the above was his answer.

Commissioner Jackson was appointed to head the Michigan Department by Governor Groesbeck in October, 1923. He remained in command all through 1924. Although a man of long police experience, most of his life in fact, he had always served a local police department. At the time he became attached to the state organization he was head of the law division of the Detroit (Mich.) police department with the rank of inspector and the manner in which he handled the traffic situation in the city of Detroit had much to do with Governor A. J. Groesbeck selecting him to head the Department of Public Safety.

"The success of the State Police organizations in the states that now have them assures their future. In my opinion," said Commissioner Jackson, "and the successes already obtained and those of the future, will lead other states to fall into line and adopt such law enforcement agencies. As time goes on and situations develop to states that do not have a State Police force, similar to situations which have been met and conquered by State Police forces, state law enforcement advocates will realize how their states can profit as others did and urge the passage of necessary laws creating the organization of State Police units."

Force Earns Its Way
"If properly managed, a State Police force can be made to be almost self-sustaining. That could be made possible by having a large portion of the fines collected in State Police convictions and perhaps some of the other fees collected in the work be set back to the operation of the force. And in connection with this question I want to stress upon a saving that is made to the counties through the State Police. In Michigan, and I suppose it is the same in most other states, the counties allow their sheriff's department, certain amounts each year for hiring special deputies and other such assistance as he may need. A State Police organization does, to a large extent, relieve that burden because a most important part of the work is done in cooperation with the local officers, particularly the county officers whose territory is widely scattered."

Commissioner Jackson said that his department has sent out a number of bulletins to the sheriff's departments in every county in the state informing them that the State Police is at their disposal and advising where the nearest State Police post is located and how it can be reached in the shortest possible time, day or night.

Cities Are Numerous
The Michigan force is composed of about 180 men, 150 of whom are in uniform, the others doing plain clothes work, handling investigations, etc., in which a uniform would endanger the results.
In addition to doing general police work the Michigan State Police do traffic work, conduct inspections of all entering the state, transfer of prisoners from state institution to state institution, assist in investigations of suspected arson cases, and have the supervision of men paroled from prison.

The Department of Public Safety is divided into several divisions. One is the State Police, and others are the fire marshal's division, bureau of identification and the detective bureau, all manned by state policemen. The fire marshal's division until a few years ago was a separate department of state government. About two years ago the bureau of identification was organized and the detective bureau was started during Commissioner Jackson's regime. The all inspection work comes under the fire marshal's division and the supervision of paroled men is a part of the State Police division.
Since the adoption of the prohibition amendment its enforcement has fallen to a great extent into the hands of the State Police in states having such organizations.

50,000 IN LIFE-SAVING SERVICE OF RED CROSS

Additional 50,000 Water Safety Experts Probable Gain of Summer Campaign.

A boy watched an expert give a class a lesson in the way to revive a person unconscious from water immersion. The next day the boy tried it on a bathing companion and saved his life. Such a boy has just won all the effort and the cost of the Life-Saving Service, American Red Cross officials declare. The Red Cross method of restoring partly drowned persons is so simple that the continued large sacrifice of life must decrease as an informed public insists upon general instruction in proper procedure practice to every citizen.

The Red Cross Life-Saving Service in every part of the country, summer and winter, is engaged in teaching this method as an integral part of swimming and life-saving. This service has grown from a single expert in 1914 to a corps of almost 50,000 active life-savers. In this tenth year of the work it is predicted that fully 50,000 more experts will be eligible for membership in the corps. This large accession in a single year is confidently expected as, the result of the campaign among 22,000 troops of Boy Scouts and a similar quality of at least two life-guards in each troop.

During the past year 4,746 men, 2,374 women, 9,731 boys and girls successfully passed the rigid tests of the Red Cross—increased of 5,331 over 1923. Intensive instruction in developing hundreds of qualified examiners for the Red Cross Life-Saving Corps, who supplement the teaching staffs maintained by the national organization. The cause of water safety is therefore penetrating to new sections and eventually will cover all American territory.

Recognition of this Red Cross service for humanity is growing apace. At the request of the War Department every military training camp had life-saving instruction for its soldiers. Military officials have adopted the Red Cross course, public and private schools are offering it to students, business, civic and athletic organizations are adopting it, and police departments are making it a part of the conditioning process for their recruits.

Volunteer life-savers throughout the country, the American Red Cross reports, are eagerly advancing the cause of water safety, 283 volunteers receiving medals for giving from 200 to 300 hours service in two or three years. In addition 35 persons have been awarded members of the Red Cross Corps who saved one or more lives during the year.

It is for the work and extension of life-saving that continued support through memberships is sought, and the American Red Cross urges all persons to join or renew membership during the enrollment campaign opening Armistice Day, November 11.

Red Cross Invites All Into Neutral Army of Service

There are 3,039 counties in the United States and more than 2,500 Chapters of the American Red Cross. The Chapter is the local unit of the national organization, formed to carry out the program, services and policies of the Red Cross. The industry of these 3,039 local units is a voluntary and steady outpouring of well-doing and sympathy which softens human suffering and distress wherever it arises. This work is absolutely neutral, for the Red Cross knows no race, no creed, no color.

The strength of the American Red Cross being in its Chapters, the organization annually invites the people to join or renew their membership during a Roll Call which always begins on Armistice Day, November 11.

"It is this annual enlistment of millions of Americans under the banner of the American Red Cross which makes possible the continued work of this great and democratic legion of mercy," says Judge John Barto, chairman of the national organization. "Membership in the Red Cross is a privilege within the reach of everyone. The need for service grows more insistent each year. To keep pace with the demands which come from every section of our country, we must have the people's loyal support. Our capacity for service is limited to the extent to which we receive support for our work in the coming Roll Call."

The invitation of the American Red Cross is unlimited. The enrollment period, Armistice Day to Thanksgiving, is everyone's opportunity to join.

Annual Summons to Service
The annual nation-wide Roll Call of the American Red Cross to enroll members for 1925 will open on Nov. 11, the anniversary of that issue and never-to-be-forgotten Armistice Day six years ago, which silenced the crashing arms of the World War. The enrollment will continue for 17 days, through Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 27. Preliminary to the Roll Call period will come Red Cross Sunday, Nov. 9. During the 17 days set aside for the enrollment more than 3,500 Chapters of the Red Cross and their thousands of branches will invite the people to join the Red Cross or renew their membership.

Office in the Air

What is claimed to be the first office in the air is in use on the trans-American air line between New York and San Francisco, over which flies an airway inspector who supervises the maintenance of the guiding signs and facilities along the 3,000 miles route. The inspector has a desk, chair, and table, and the inspector is accompanied by a clerk, who operates a typewriter while in flight.

Delivery Man Travels Far

In figuring out the efficiency of his delivery system a merchant of moderate size has recently estimated that his auto trucks go on an average 27,000 miles a year, assuming he has a fair run of business for 300 days in the year. The truck will average 100 stops a day, doing 88 miles in the usual eight hours. The cost figures out about 4 cents a stop.

Still Chasing the Pest

Paris green as a mosquito exterminator is being tried out by the United States Department of Agriculture. The Paris green has been dusted on swampy land by airplanes, the experiment being made in Louisiana. In this experiment the Paris green was diluted with road dust or some similar substance such as triphos.

Largest Warehouse

The largest warehouse in the United States has just been completed in Cincinnati. It stretches over two blocks, is 614 feet long and 175 feet wide, has seven floors and contains over 1,000,000 square feet of floor space. It has 250 concrete pillars and cost \$3,600,000.

Odd Place for Bird's Nest

A thrush built a nest, which contained four young birds, amongst the electrical apparatus of one of the substations of the North Wales Power company, Minford, Wales.
