EXEMPT OWNERS FROM LIABILITY

Owners and drivers of privately operated automobiles would be exempted from all liability in connection with the injury of passengers, under the terms of a measure offered in the house by Representative David Brake, Newaygo. The only exceptions would be when the driver could be proved to have set out willfully to injure a passenger. The exemption would apply only when passengers were riding on invitation, and not when they were paying fares.
