Moved by Bicking, supported by Lamb that motor cycle officers' salary be \$1000 for the coming year. Carried.

Moved and carried that health officers salary be same as last year.

Moved by Bicking and supported by Russell that village engineer's salary be \$2,050 for the coming year and that he be allowed an extra \$200 for use and upkeep of machine. Carried all yeas.

Moved by Warner, supported by Russell that the assistant engineer's salary be \$1700 for the coming year. Carried all yeas.

Moved by Warner, supported by Cook that proper sidewalk grade be established and laid at Oakland and Wilmarth avenues providing that Mr. Edward Pierce same. Lumber for the same.

Money to be returned to him at face value without interest. Carried.

Moved by Lamb and supported by Russell that Warner and Bicking, together with the president be appointed a committee to secure a reduction in insurance rates. Carried.


