WHAT IS THE MATTER WITH LICENSE LAW?

That is the law demanding that everybody fourteen years of age and over, must have a license issued by the State before they are allowed to drive an automobile in the state.

Section 3 says: "The application must be approved by" Chief of Police, Clerk of the Township, Sheriff or one of his deputies or a representative of the Commissioner of Public Safety, after an oral examination or practical demonstration, both examinations to include questions touching upon such applicants knowledge of the motor vehicle law, and no license shall be granted without this approval leaving of course the right of appeal to the Secretary of State.

Section 4. Says among other things that a "license card or tag shall be issued bearing the name, address and description of the licensee for identification purpose." Now I take it for granted there is a need for this identification of drivers under certain circumstances, and if it became necessary to locate them, and this is one strong reason why this law was passed, the fee only being sufficient to pay for the recording, issuing and handling the details, therefore not a money raising measure. The question now arising is, does it serve the purpose for which it was passed, or is it ineoperative and a useless expense to the auto driver?

While some of the persons before mentioned follow out the requirements of the law as to a positive examination before applying an application, many do not, which nullifies the work of those who do, and if a driver's application is turned down by the rigid examination he has but to arrange with some one in some other jurisdiction to forward his mail, give the friends address, and the intent of the law is frustrated.

The law abiding dependable citizen obtains his license in a manner prescribed by the law, he moves seldom, and if he is unfortunate and it becomes necessary to write him up for any infraction, he can be found at the address shown on his "Drivers License" and he must submit to the full penalty of the law.

The other class gets his license as before mentioned, or is rooming or boarding and he moves frequently, he gladly presents his license when demanded by an officer, with the knowledge that when the time comes to look him up, he will not be found there, for he has moved three or four times since he received his license, or if the case is serious he figures he will move soon, and although he is being written up continually he never appears in court or pays a fine.

The dependable citizen takes his medicine like a man, the other kind who are a menace to safe drivers is rarely apprehended. We claim to lead the world in all things pertaining to the automobile, and its use, yet some foreign countries lead us when it comes to real understanding of the needs, possibly we are too busy producing to properly regulate, and it is time we were giving some attention to regulation.

Our present license system is looked upon as a joke, by those who wish to drive. It has no meaning to them, it is of no value to the good driver, who sees children and people almost blind, with them in their possession, driving heavy cars in a dangerous manner avoiding accidents only through superhuman efforts of others.

Let us make a license to direct a potential engine of death through the streets and highways mean something to its owner, and of value when they get it, and make it so that when necessary to locate them it can be done in the majority of cases and I suggest for your consideration a plan. Make the license a four page affair of a handy size, page two contains a photo, same as a passport or taxi drivers license, page three for the name and address given at the time of issuing, and room for five changes of address.

Let us have a law that makes it

a misdemeanor not to fill in his name address every time he moves, and print this law on the front page, and when he has moved five times, issue him a new one, for a nominal figure on receipt of the old.

While this would not help materially in locating a crook it will reduce to a minimum the "smart aleck" whose only thought is to evade responsibility for his acts.

"ABIE'S IRISH ROSE" STILL IN DETROIT

"Abie's Irish Rose," now in its fourth week at the Garrick theatre, Detroit, is making theatrical history in Michigan. Every indication now points toward a summer run for the celebrated Anne Nichols comedy. Seats are selling for the fifth week and the management announces that the show, at least, will stay until August.

In New York last week "Abie" entered the fourth year of the Broadway run, reaching a mark never before touched by any show. "Abie" now holds the long-run record in America, having played longer in New York than "Lightnin'," its nearest competitor.

As for Detroit, no show ever stayed over four weeks and a few only tarried that long. "Abie" will beat all records there starting next Sunday. The Detroit company is the same that played in Chicago for fifty-eight weeks and the wisecracks are predicting, that inasmuch as Detroit is half the size of Chicago the show will linger half as long, a total of twenty-nine weeks.

Long lines of eager patrons have sought tickets ever since the opening. At the end of this week more than 46,000 persons will have witnessed the performance at the Garrick. Never has there been a vacant space since the opening on May 3.

The out-of-town visitor is requested to make reservations in advance. The prices are \$2.50, \$2 and \$1.50, plus ten per cent. tax.

NATIONAL DAIRY MEET TO BE HELD IN STATE

Prominent dairy men from all parts of the country will gather at Grand Rapids on June 2 and 3 for the fortieth annual convention of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, the largest cattle bred association in the world.

The last time the "black and white" cattle gathering was held in Michigan was in 1916. Frank O. Lovden, former governor of Illinois, is president of the national association, a position held for seven years by D. D. Aitken, of Flint, prominent state dairy man.

There will be 163 delegates from forty-four states and Canadian provinces at the convention, according to J. G. Hayes, dairy extension man at the Michigan State College, and secretary of the state Holstein-Friesian association. Michigan, the fifth largest Holstein state, will have ten official delegates at the convention.
