You might consider a mix-ture of 2.4-D and 2.4.5-T if you want to kill brush and woody plants where poison ivy grows.

Strawberry: The Favorite From Florida To Alaska

Strawberries are America's most popular small fruit. They can be grown from Alaska to Florida, and they can be grown on almost any kind of soil, providing the proper variety is chosen. The common cultivated strawberries are derived from wild species found growing on the Pacific coasts of North and

the Pacific coasts of North and South America and in the east-ern part of North America. Although strawberries grow on a wide yariety of soils, the ideal soil is a deep sandy or gravelly loam overlaving a substrata of moisture retentives soil. Good drainage is important, and a soil well supplied with organic material will be soft and easy to work and not subject to drying out.

STRAWBERRY plants are usually set out in early spring, but they may be planted in fall if the plants are well mulched before very cold weather ar-

before very cold weather arrives.

There are several systems for growing strawberries. They may be grown in "hills" in in "matted rows." For hills the plants are set 12 to 18 miches apart. All the runners are removed as they appear, leaving the original plants to produce the crop of berries which are of a superior quality. This system is best for "everbearing" varieties as they produce few runners.

With the matted row system, the plants are set 1½ to 2½ feet apart in the rows and all the runners are allowed to

212 feet apart in the rows and all the runners are allowed to develop. Since this often results in overcrowding, a better system is the marrow matted own. Plants are set 18 inches apart. The first runners are turned along the rows four to six inches from the parent plant and later runners are removed, making rows about a foot wide.

The first season after planting all blossom's should be removed so no fruit is formed and sturdy plants will be developed.

Csually strawberries can have two or three, seasons of fruiting before they have to be replanted.

WEEDING IS ONE of the main chores during the first growing season. The bed should be cultivated frequently to eliminate the weeds while they are still small. Excess runners can be easily removed at this time. too. A thorough weeding in spring is needed during the fruiting spring is needed during the fruiting spring is needed during the fruiting should be first if ripening. An inch of water per week is desirable. Soil seakers of caaws or perforated plastic bose are a good means of irrigating. Watering seems more important for a big yield than giving extra fertilizer. However on infertile soils it is beneficial to use a complete chemical fertilizer. Also nitrogen may be applied in mid-August to stimulate production of bud for the following season the spring part is apt to result in off berries and rot.

Strawberries should be malched in winter with a layer of straw spread two or three first few hard frosts but before the temperature gets below 20 degrees. In the rows between the plants to keep the berries clean and the seeds down.

STRAWBERRIES are easily propagated from young plants formed in July on the runners. These are best if taken from plants that have not been allowed to fruit the year the runners are taken.
