

Library Board Is Disappointed In Fund Loss

FARMINGTON — The Farmington Library Board's current request for federal funds to aid in building the new library has been turned down by the State Board of Education.

The State Board of Education, which administers the funds under the Library Services and Construction Act, Title II, made the decision June 10.

According to Mrs. Mary F. Allison, library board secretary, the decision left board members "bitterly disappointed."

"However, the architects will proceed with the plans for the building. This just means that we may not be able to fully finish the basement areas," Mrs. Allison said.

The board received word Friday of the action, in a letter from Francis X Scannell, state librarian.

"On June 10, the State Board of Education reviewed eight applications for grants of money under the Library Services and Construction Act, Title II, P.L. 86-269. Dr. John Porter, acting state superintendent of public instruction, has asked me to notify you that the board did not approve your application for funds.

"We both regret having to send such a notice, but as you know the board funded only three out of eight applications at this time," the letter concluded.

Mrs. Allison said she has

asked State Representative Raymond Baker (R-Farmington) to obtain a fuller explanation and expressed some displeasure in not receiving a better, more detailed reply from the State Board of Education.

"When the plans for the new library were developed, federal support of approximately 30% of costs of \$320,000, was included in our cost figures. With the rejection of this support, certain phases of the building and equipment will, of necessity, be delayed in completion. Final completion of all phases in the original plans must therefore be delayed pending the accumulation of funds received from local support," Mrs. Allison said.

SHE NOTED that construction would move ahead so that "continuing spiraling costs don't cause further difficulties."

Mrs. Allison said this was the board's fourth application for funds.

A \$1.5 million structure is planned on a site on Twelve Mile Rd. south of O.E. Dunckel Junior High.

Assets of more than \$818,000 were reported early last month, as money from the one mill property tax voted for the library.
