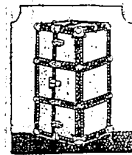

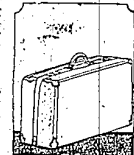

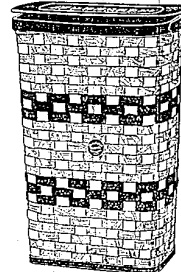

**CONVENTION OF RELIGIOUS EDUCATORS NOV. 4, 5, 6**

A state-wide three-days convention on the "State of the Commonwealth," in so far as it involves moral and religious education, is now announced for Detroit, November 4, 5, and 6, under the auspices of the Michigan Sunday School Council of Religious Education. The dominant note running throughout the whole three days program will be "Week Day Religious Instruction" and plans are being taken to bring to the platform an ample number of men and women who from the various angles of experience will present for discussion their own points of view. The entire field of the Sunday School including its extension features will be covered by special group meetings.

Plans are being laid, according to Executive Secretary J. H. Engle, to make a strong appeal to the public school leaders of the state and to the most influential ministers. It is hoped that out of all the discussion there will be a precipitation that shall crystallize as a sort of norm for the procedure. "Week Day Religious Instruction" says Mr. Engle, "is the most vital subject of the hour, requiring the most careful consideration in order to avoid foolish excess or unwise procedure." The continent is being searched for pioneers in this new field in order that this unusual event may be made worth while to the two thousand or more persons expected to register.

The Michigan Sunday School Council is a cooperative organization sponsored by seventeen Protestant Evangelical denominations of the state. Prior to 1922 the Michigan Sunday School Association operated in this capacity but in an unofficial way. The proposed meeting for Detroit marks the departure of this new council from the old custom of an annual gathering and the beginning of a series of biennial state-wide meetings. The Metropolis of Michigan was wisely chosen for this first fathering. The National Denominational boards are being requested to release one or more of their specialists to assist in the program. Professor H. Augustine Smith, the well known director of music and instructor in the fine arts in religion, will be present as will also Dr. D. W. Kurtz of McPherson, Kas.

This cooperative inter-church event deserves the support and attendance of community minded people, as well as leaders in the field of religious activities. Delegates from local Sunday schools will be expected to be named and be in attendance.
