BIBLE CONFERENCE

On Sabbath morning, July 26, the Twenty-first Annual Bible Conference will be opened at Lake Orion. The opening sermon will be preached by Rev. Cassius E. Wakefield, D. D., the president of the Conference, and for many years associated with the Methodist ministers of Michigan, but now president of the Flower hospital, Toledo, O. Mr. Homer Rodheaver, the renowned song leader and trombonist, will have charge of the music. Mr. Rodheaver and three members of his faculty have been engaged to stay through the Bible Conference which follows the week of the Song Leaders' Training School.

It being the purpose of those in charge of this conference to furnish the greatest possible help to ministers and Sabbath school workers of every church, they are able to announce that Mr. Louis W. Entaminger has been secured to speak twice on the opening Sunday, 3:30 and 7:30 p. m. He will also speak on Monday afternoon, and possibly on Monday morning. It is said of Mr. Entaminger, "He thrills his hearers while he gives them practical methods for Sabbath school classes both in numbers of attendance and evangelistic growth."

It is also announced that the committee has been able to secure Dr. Melvin Grove Kyle, the man who located the sea-covered ruins of the ancient Sodom. Mr. Kyle stands among the very first of the world's greatest archaeologists. He will speak on Monday morning, the 27th, at 11:00 o'clock; also Tuesday and Wednesday at the same hour. He will speak on Monday evening, the 27th, at 8:00 o'clock.

Rev. C. H. Woolston, D. D., of the East Baptist Church, Philadelphia, will have charge of the Children's Hour daily at 9:00 o'clock, at which time he will instruct primary teachers and all Christian workers who desire to become workers with children, by actually holding and molding audiences of children. Parents and interested friends are earnestly requested to see to it that their children have the advantage of Dr. Woolston's experience.

Rev. George McNeely of Newark, N. J., is coming again for the fourth season. He will speak at day daily; and on Saturday at 2:00 o'clock Rev. Henry Singer of the Hebrew Mission of Detroit will speak.

There is another man this year who, although among the younger of the ministers, is gathering about him, through his eloquent and convincing presentation of Bible truth, one of the largest and most powerful congregations in the Presbyterian denomination—Rev. W. B. McClure of New Castle, Pa. He will come to Orion on Thursday, July 30, and will speak daily throughout the remaining conference period at 11:00 o'clock, varying over the closing Sunday, August 3, and giving the final address in the large auditorium at 7:30 o'clock.

Among the visiting speakers from abroad, Rev. J. Rhys Davies, from Wales, will speak daily at 10:00 o'clock from Tuesday to Saturday. Mr. Davies was associated in the great Welsh revival, and is identified with many of the leading religious movements of Wales today.

There will be also an opportunity to hear some of the leading evangelists of America, among them being Dr. W. E. Biedervolf, who will speak on the closing Sunday in the morning at 10:30 and in the afternoon at 3:30. Other evangelists will be at the Sunset meeting.

In the daily program the first meeting will be held in the morning at 6:30 under the direction of Rev. James B. Elr, D. D., and will be strictly observed for prayer for specific objects.

RADIO CONTEST TO STIMULATE INTEREST IN CLASSICAL MUSIC

Music Lovers Gossip Artists and Selections for Prizes.

Through the co-operation of the Brunswick-Balke-Clender Company, Stations WJZ, New York; WGY, Schenectady, and WRC, Washington, D. C., will combine in a special broadcast of two great features in the most elegant presentation of musical education which has ever been offered to the radio audience. "The Brunswick Music Memory Contest," consisting of special broadcasts beginning in February, will present world-famous artists in the largest contest for the advancement of musical appreciation in America ever scheduled. Listeners in every state of the Union, as well as a considerable portion of Canada and Mexico, will be able to participate through one of the three stations. Famous artists and organizations will render the greatest of compositions with no introductory or explanatory announcement. The radio listeners will guess who the artist and what the selection is in each instance. To stimulate public interest in the recognition of the foremost artists and compositions the Brunswick contest has arranged a schedule of awards totaling five thousand dollars for the persons guessing the largest number of names, both of artists and of compositions, correctly. A short essay on a subject to be announced each month will also be required of contestants. Artists of the Metropolitan Opera Company will participate.

Radio Transmission Theories Confirmed During Eclipse of Sun

Signals Blotted Out as Moon Skims Over Sun.

Engineers and scientists were hard at work in laboratory and field observation stations recently when the rays of the sun were temporarily intercepted by the passing moon and great shadows were cast upon the

earth. It is well known that the efficiency of radio transmission is affected by the sun's rays and the recent eclipse afforded an opportunity to observe the characteristics of radio waves under ideal conditions. Observers were stationed in various parts of the country and will soon compare the results of their findings thereby adding to the fund of data which has been accumulating since the ether was conquered only a few short years ago. The tests conducted included a study of the behavior of short and long waves. The short wave band included 55 to about 100 meters and the broadcast station band between 200 and 500 meters as well as the waves employed in transoceanic radio communication, 8,000 to 25,000 meters. Each of these groups of waves were affected differently as the sun's rays were cut off from the earth, according to the observers. The results of the tests are awaited with great interest by the radio world and it is said will prove highly useful and practical in solving communication problems.

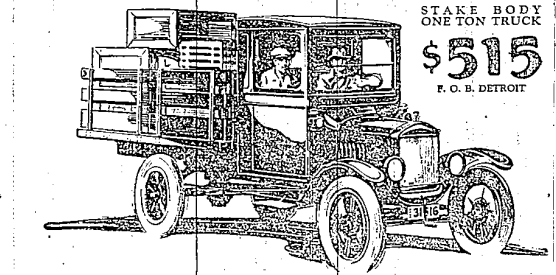
