FARMERS WILL STUDY

M. S. C. TEST FIELDS
Guided by special tour routes, which are to be lined out by arrows and signs, thousands of Michigan farmers will inspect the extensive experimental fields at Michigan State College on Friday, July 31.

While the entertainment side of the farm day is being given a lot of attention this year, the fact that most of the visitors will be interested in the scientific agricultural work at the college is not being lost sight of by those in charge of arrangements. Inspection trips to various parts of the 1,200-acre farm, so planned as to "take in" the most interesting features, are being carefully outlined.

Hundreds of acres of crops and soils test work, forest nurseries and woodlots, truck gardens, orchards, the livestock barns, and the college buildings themselves are included in some one of the several optional tours which will be ready for inspection.

The horse pulling contest, using the new dynamometer, will rival the tours for morning interest, while everything will center around the big open air meeting in the afternoon. The general meeting is scheduled to start at 1:00 o'clock, eastern time, and will include various entertainment features in addition to the strong speaking program.

As usual, farmers are being urged to "bring the whole family" to the July 31 conference. Farmers Day really takes the form of a big informal picnic, the entire family finding interest in the day's program.
