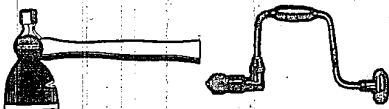

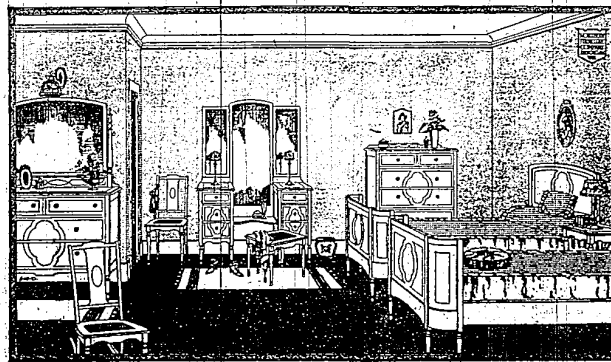

Mrs. W. H. Sprague of Highland visited Wednesday with her daughter, Mrs. Carey Coe.

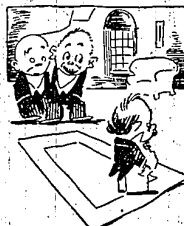
Miss Dorothy Lancaster is leaving Saturday for a two weeks vacation with relatives in Plymouth.
