Mr. Kennedy was a Civil War veteran and died from injuries received in an automobile accident two weeks ago.

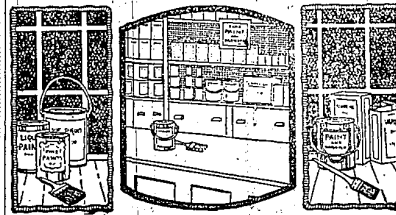

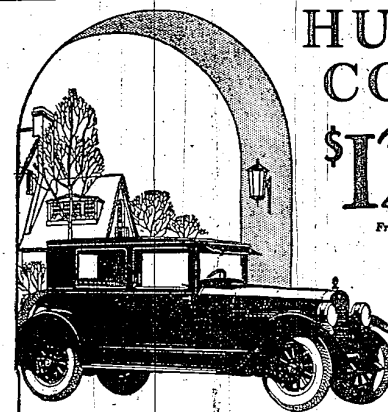
