Glass Houses May Be

Residences of Future

Plans for building houses of glass are being considered by glass experts.

Opaque glass can be produced in great quantities, it is claimed, at a reasonable cost.

"The glass house," says a writer in a trade journal, "has been the butt of many jokes, when not actually used as a target for brickbats. 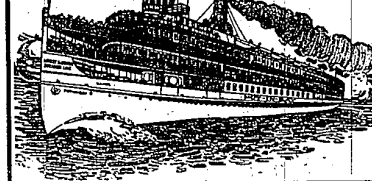
