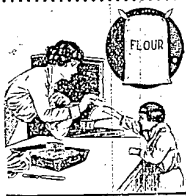

On the 13th of September St. Paul's Lutheran Church will celebrate its annual mission-festival with two special services, a German service at 10:00 a. m. and an English service at 7:30 p. m. Rev. M. C. Baade from Norwalk, O., will preach in the morning, and Rev. A. Ebendick from River Rouge, Mich., in the evening. Special choir music in both services.

The Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, O. and other states, with which St. Paul's Church is united, supports about one thousand missionaries, maintains over two thousand missions, proclaims the Gospel in twenty-one languages—in English, German, French, Spanish, Portuguese, Danish, Polish, Lettish, Slavonian, Lithuanian, Finnish, Swedish, Italian, Yiddish, Tamil, Malayalam, Telugu, Urdu, Arabic and Chinese, including the sign-language for the deaf and dumb. It spreads the glad tidings of salvation, in thirteen countries—in Canada, the United States, Mexico, the West Indies, Brazil, Argentina, Paraguay, England, Denmark, Germany, France (Alsace-Lorraine), India and China. It tells men of the white and the red, and the black and the yellow races of Christ, and carries the message of God's grace into four continents—North America, South America, Europe and Asia.

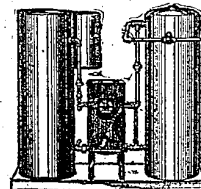
