Mrs. Emmet Williams is visiting her family in Coshocton, O., with her young son, Rodney.

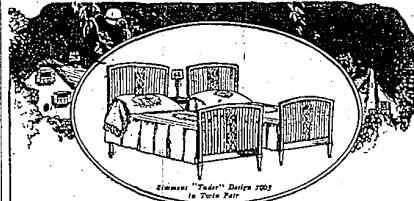

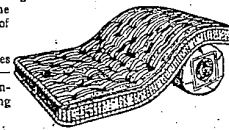

## SPECIAL ELECTION

To be held in the Village of Farmington, Monday, September 14, 1925, at the Town Hall in the Village of Farmington to vote upon the adoption of a city charter and the election of nine charter commissioners.

The foregoing Special Election will be held as above stated for the purpose of determining whether or not the Village of Farmington of Oakland County, State of Michigan shall by the vote of the qualified electors of said Village at such Special Election become a Fifth Class City under the provisions of the Home Rule Act so-called.

If by the vote of the qualified electors of said Village of Farmington at said Special Election, it shall be determined that said Village of Farmington shall be incorporated as and become a Fifth Class City as aforesaid, then the further purpose of said Special Election shall be to elect from the Candidates for the Charter Commission, nine electors of said Village of Farmington to constitute a Charter Commission whose duty after being duly elected shall be to prepare and draft a proposed Charter for said Fifth Class City in accordance with the statute in such case made and provided.
