Board Studies Vandalism, Courses, Report Cards

to find the culprit," he added. The fire is an insured loss. "There are still many, many leads to chase down," Prisk continued. He said there are suspicions that youngsters both in the community and outside it may be involved.

Wood Creek Elementary School was recently vandalized three nights in a row. The fourth night, three young men were apprehended coming into the building, explained Prisk.

The three boys will now have records, but when they turn 17 the records will be eliminated if they have maintained good behavior during probation.

"By the way, the vandals came from the immediate area of the school," Prisk mentioned.

"They weren't from across the tracks." At the last school board meeting, decision to discontinue formal semester or trimester schedules at Farmington schools was postponed.

The matter came up before the board again in a motion by Richard W. Frankel, board member. "Can we do something to make final exams an educational experience?" asked Frankel. He moved that "teachers in secondary schools be given the option to schedule final exams for their courses at times they feel fit and where final exams are appropriate and part of the educational process in their courses."

Frankel saw this method as "a move away from rigidity in our system." The motion was defeated in a 3 to 1 vote.

with board members Perrin, Peters and Washburn voting against the change and Frankel, Lichtman and Vagnozzi voting for it.

The board also heard a report on the social studies programs at the three Farmington high schools.

A semester course in psychology will be taught on an experimental basis in the fall. Other proposed new courses would center on communism, the American presidency, anthropology and diplomatic U.S. history.

This year the social studies programs saw a drop of sections in international relations and economics. In addition, courses concentrating on a particular continent weren't as popular as ancient, medieval and modern European history.

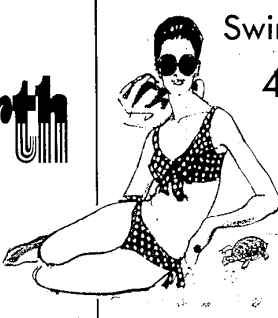
