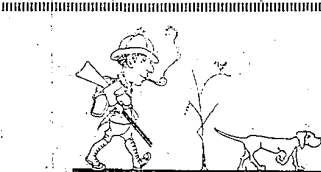

NATIONAL DAIRY SHOW DRAWS MICHIGAN MEN

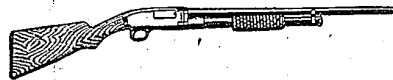
